Did a lithium ion battery cause a fire in New York City?

NEW YORK (AP) -- A lithium ion battery sparked a fire that killed one person and injured 17 others at a New York City apartment building, fire officials said Saturday. Friday's two-alarm fire began just after 2 p.m. on the third floor of a six-story building in Harlem.

Did a lithium-ion battery cause a fire at a Harlem apartment building?

NEW YORK -- A lithium-ion battery caused a deadly fire at a Harlem apartment building Friday, according to the FDNY. One person was killed, 17 were injured and dozens of people were displaced. The raging fire forced dramatic and rare rope rescues. "People was coming out of the building. The fire at the top.

How many people have died from lithium-ion batteries in New York City?

They start to smolder and within 20-30 seconds they erupt into flames," FDNY Chief of Department John Hodgins said Monday. So far in 2023, the city has seen 93 people killed in fires and 17 of those fatalities have been due to lithium-ion batteries, according to Kavanagh.

Are batteries a fire hazard in New York City?

"This is for all day," he said before rushing off to pick up an order. The battery-swapping cabinet is only one part of New York City's efforts to prevent fires from lithium-ion batteries, which power the e-bikes and e-scooters that have flooded city streets in recent years. The batteries have also become deadly fire hazards.

Are lithium batteries causing fires?

With little or no warning, the batteries can ignite, leaving seconds for people to escape. In just three years, lithium battery fires have tied electrical fires and have surpassed blazes started by cooking and smoking for major causes of fatal fires in the city. Reasons for the uptick of these fires are myriad.

Are lithium-ion batteries dangerous?

Kavanagh called lithium-ion batteries "incredibly deadly" because so much fire is created when they ignite. "It can often be too late, as soon as the fire has begun," she said.
