


Lithium battery swallowed symptoms

What happens if you swallow a lithium battery?

There is an emerging danger hiding in your home -- lithium batteries, also known as button batteries -- causing injuries and death in children. When swallowed, these small batteries get stuck in the esophagus (throat).

Akathisia can occur as a side effect of long-term use of antipsychotic medications, such as lithium.

What happens if you put a lithium battery in your esophagus?

The saliva triggers an electric current which causes a chemical reaction that can severely burn the esophagus in as little as two hours, creating an esophageal perforation, vocal cord paralysis, or even erosion into the airway (trachea), or major blood vessels. Lithium batteries can be found in everything in your home.

What should I do if my child swallowed a lithium battery?

Prompt action is critical. Don't wait for symptoms to develop. If the battery was swallowed within the prior 12 hours, especially if it might have been a lithium coin cell, and the child is able to swallow, give 2 tablespoons honey every 10 minutes while going to the ER. Do not delay going to the ER to give honey.

What happens if you swallow a battery?

Most swallowed batteries cause no problem. Batteries lodged in the esophagus (the food pipe between mouth and stomach) must be removed immediately. They cause damage by their pressure against the wall of the esophagus, from leakage of caustic alkali, and the electrical current they generate. Injury can occur in as short a time as one hour.

What happens if you swallow a disk battery?

The person who has swallowed a disk battery may have one or more symptoms. Although mercury-containing cells tend to fragment, no clinical cases of mercury poisoning have been reported. Signs of mercury poisoning are lethargy, excitement, rash in the perineal/diaper region, or tremors. What Procedures and Tests Diagnose Battery Ingestion?

1. Hazardous foreign body (Not button battery or super strong magnet) Management pathway See separate pathways for Button batteries and super strong magnets remove immediately 2. Doctor's Notes on Battery Ingestion (Swallowed Battery) Battery ingestion signs and symptoms unfortunately may not become obvious until the battery begins to harm tissue. Be especially careful with products containing larger batteries, like 3 volt lithium ion batteries. Batteries the size of a penny or larger are especially risky: They're small enough for a child to swallow, and large enough to get stuck in their throat. These batteries are found in ...

For button battery ingestion, investigators found that all 5 cases with lithium battery (≥ 1.5 cm, 3 V) ingestion presented moderate to major complications in the esophagus and stomach without any symptoms, but that the 7 cases with alkaline battery (< 1.5 cm, 1.5 V) ingestion did not present any complications.

Call 1-800-498-8666 for guidance if someone swallows a battery. Most button batteries pass through the body and are eliminated in the stool. However, sometimes batteries get "hung up", and these are the ones that cause problems. A battery that is stuck in the esophagus is especially likely to cause tissue damage.
